Dear Friends,

The 2019-2020 school year has come to a close, but in a far different manner than we ever could have imagined back in September! As of this writing, we are emerging from strict quarantine measures and beginning to plan for the start of school in the fall. Will we be back to "business as usual"? Will we be forced to make the best of remote education methods as we did this past spring? God alone knows...but we are confident that He will enable us to continue our work of Catholic formation and education of these young souls one way or another.

Both teaching and learning were a challenge during the quarantine days this spring, and yet the COVID-19 situation has taken a far more serious toll on the finances of our Academy. Our primary fundraiser, the SJA Rollerblade-a-Thon, was devastated by the pandemic. Almost 90% of our funds are generated by students requesting donations outside local stores. measures in place, these efforts were all but shut down this year. The students still did their best to gather sponsorships from friends and relatives, but without the community support gained through our storefront campaign, our totals are down over 70% from last year.

We desperately need to add one or two part-time teachers, but without the Rollerblade-a-Thon funds, the prospect looks bleak, at best. Subjects such as art, sports, and music will likely have tight or even non-existent budgets.

The events unfolding around us have brought out the best and the worst in many people. I have confidence that the generous benefactors of St. Joseph's Academy will rise to the occasion and provide the financial assistance we need to carry on our work in these challenging times. Will you be a part of our answered prayers?

Catholic Faith and Hope in Uncertain Times

Life at St. Joseph's Church and Academy has been far from typical in recent months. Like the rest of the world, life as we know it has been turned upside down by a microscopic virus. Yet, with eyes of faith, we can see the hand of God and His loving care for us in these challenging times.

As Catholics, we know that the Church and the sacraments were established by Christ Himself. Being outside of time, God saw clearly as in a single glance the challenges, persecutions, and triumphs of His Mystical Body throughout the centuries. COVID-19 does not come as a surprise to our Heavenly Father! He has allowed this challenge to stretch our faith, give us opportunities to practice virtue, and to grow in charity.

For the students and staff at St. Joseph's Academy, as well as the parish as a whole, the past few months have been a veritable obstacle course in their efforts to live Catholic lives and complete the academic year. To start with, on March 13th the administrators and teachers of SJA planned a short break to disinfect classrooms to ensure the safety of the children. Students brought many of their books home along with a week or so of assignments. The anticipated short break grew longer and longer as government-mandated "shelter in place" orders became widespread.

As soon as a lengthy shut-down seemed inevitable, a plan was put in place to implement an online-based suite of software to centralize communication between parents and teachers, make assignments available remotely, and allow for video classes. The transition to this new technology was a bit rocky, yet it has put valuable tools in place for the academy to use in the future if remote learning continues to be necessary or when life returns to normal.

In addition to suspension of in-person instruction at the academy, the shelter-in-place orders closed the doors of St. Joseph's Church for many weeks. Indoor public Masses were prohibited for a time, but the priests and faithful of St. Joseph's knew the infinite value of just one Mass. While working within ever-tightening restrictions — which even suspended Sunday communions and confessions for a time — Sunday Masses continued to be offered with the faithful assisting from their cars in the parking lot. An FM transmitter allowed for audio and eventually sermons to be heard in the parishioners' vehicles.

The care for souls that is the backbone of the pastoral ministry led the four priests stationed at St. Joseph's Priory to spend hour after hour before the Blessed Sacrament and in a modified, well-ventilated confessional providing the sacraments in all safety to anyone who desired to come by appointment to the church. In response to the generosity of the priests, many faithful who would not normally visit the church on a regular basis made use of their unusual quarantine schedules to gain the graces being offered.

If you look with eyes of faith, it is easy to see the hidden blessings contained in this challenging chapter in the history

of the Church — and of our humble parish and academy. While there certainly were many students who struggled academically in a remote learning situation, more than a few took advantage of one-on-one time with a dedicated parent or tutor to excel in subjects that had caused difficulty in the past. Students learned organizational skills and self-discipline (to a greater or lesser degree) as they struggled to stay on top of assignments without the structure of a classroom. Many became problem-solvers by researching subjects online with the help of their parents when textbooks and lesson plans were found lacking.

The cessation of diocesan Masses also provided a unique opportunity to reach out to devout Catholics unfamiliar with the Society of Saint Pius X and St. Joseph's Church. Visitors poured in to the "parking lot Masses" in a slow but steady stream week after week. Ushers, donning the obligatory mask, distributed welcome packets explaining the importance of the traditional liturgy and inviting visitors to



look further into the riches of the traditional Catholic Faith.

As the saying goes, "When life hands you lemons, make lemonade." On a supernatural level, the teachers, students, and families of St. Joseph's have endeavored to do just that. They are grateful for the difficulties overcome and the lessons learned but pray for the day when they can return to their classrooms, frolic together at recess, and pray together in the chapel of their beloved St. Joseph's Academy.

St. Joseph's virtual classrooms allowed for some interesting innovation: a "bring your pet to class day" in Literature class!





While public indoor Masses were prohibited by law, the parishioners and visitors at St. Joseph's Church were grateful to be able to assist at the Holy Sacrifice from their vehicles in the parking lot. With the help of an FM transmitter, the sermon was even broadcast for the faithful in attendance.




Scott Hetrick
